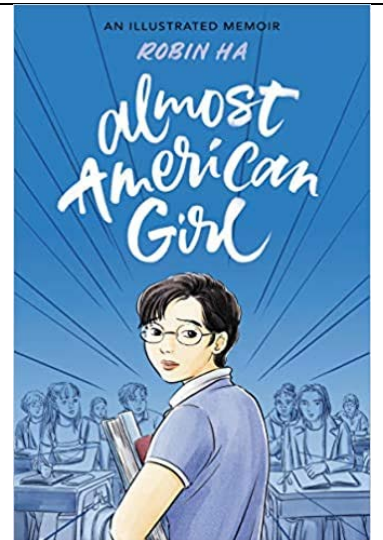


Growing up as the only child of a single mother in Seoul, Korea, wasn't always easy, but it has bonded Robin and her mum fiercely together.

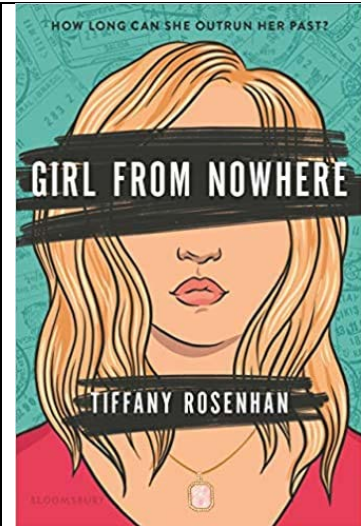

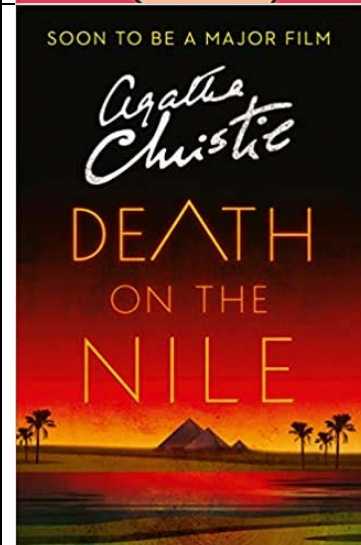
Ninety-four countries. Thirty-one schools. Two bullets. Now it's over . . . or so she thinks.

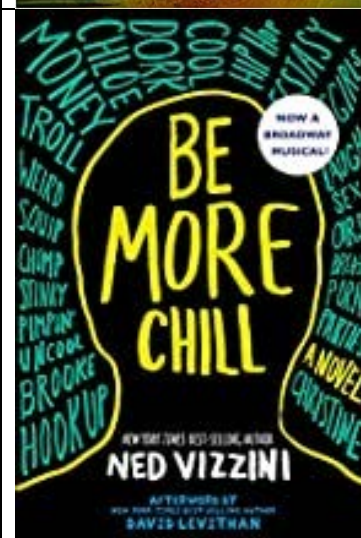

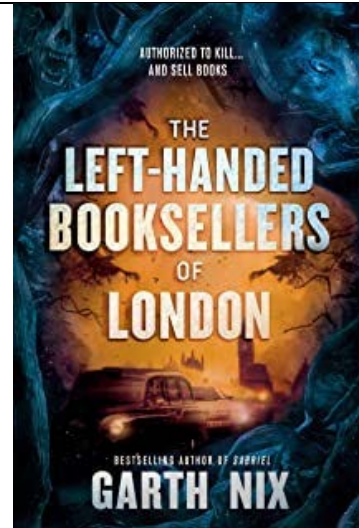
