Dear all,

We seem to be hurtling towards the end of term and I cannot quite believe that by this time next week we will have broken up for the summer. It has certainly been the most eventful of years, but we look forward to hopefully a more settled future.

Following Sunday's football match, the response by our students to the horrific racism incurred by England football players, has been deep and powerful. Today, students took part in year group debates across the campus to explore the issue of racism in football, the importance of standing up to racism and showing their support to the footballers involved. These debates will lead into a display next week, organised by student leaders, to capture their thoughts and feelings on this complex issue and how our school community can work together to promote positivity, understanding and respect for all. I am so proud of my students and the many staff involved in this important work, in ensuring that the school is not only a safe space to talk, but also to listen.

Across this week students in Years 9 and 10 have taken part in specialist workshops on the themes of healthy relationships and consent. These workshops form an essential part of our PSHE programme, but are even more important in the wake of the national Peer On Peer Abuse scandal. Thank you to all parents who took part in the webinars this week to explore how we are developing our PSHE programme from September. We look forward to the next steps in developing this important work for our students.

We are very much looking forward to our Archer Adventure next Wednesday. Please do ensure that you have reviewed the information about the day for your child, noting that the day is different for each year group. Students will bring their sponsorship forms home today and we hope that each child will make every effort to raise £10 towards our Raise the Roof campaign. Students should bring their sponsorship money to school next Thursday.

You will be aware that there is a national change in COVID restrictions from Monday 19th July. However, at school we will be maintaining all COVID risk management strategies until the end of term. We wish to take every step to keep everyone safe next week and ensure a good start to the holiday. I shall write to all parents next week with details about how we will be responding to government guidance for the new academic year.

This will be the final newsletter of the current academic year, however, I shall send out a short review next Thursday, following our whole school assembly.



Last week Thematic Learning welcomed visiting experts to our year 8 unit on diseases. The line-up was impressive and included Professor Rubinstein who shared some of his insights on drug development; Professor Edmunds shared his experiences on SAGE and Covid as well as other diseases including Cholera and Polio; brain surgeon Mr Morris inspired students with his tales from the operating table and a real brain skull and Dr Griggs expanded on our prior knowledge of Malaria and took some great questions about the day to day life of a GP.

All in all, a chance to learn something new and, I think for some students, sowing the seeds for a future in medicine! We are hugely indebted to our speakers for giving up their time and our students for posing such good questions.

THE FUTURE OF MEAT – Mr Wick

On Wednesday 14th the Archer had our second Science Hub. This week we had the opportunity to watch together a short documentary on "The Future of Meat." It opened our minds to the concept of meat being considered more of a product than having come from a living animal. We discussed the importance of humans reducing their animal product intake and whether it's an important facet to include in society; and we shared our thoughts on why humans have such a strong emotional connection to the meat they do ingest.

This hub we were also joined by the Archer Alumnus Emily McCarthy who is completing an Extended Project Qualification on the matter of meat consumption. She shared her project idea of how societies engage with the food they eat and how important our emotional connection is to the types of meat we consume. What do you like about the art therapy sessions?

"I've enjoyed going at my own pace. It has felt restful to focus on creating something"

"It is quiet and that makes me feel happy and calm. I like that it has just been me and Sophia because she is nice. She's always kind"

"I find some lessons stressful, coming to art therapy has helped me relax and it has been fun"

"I don't always want to come to school, in fact this morning I thought I really don't want to go in but then I thought I have art therapy and I want to do that"

"Usually I find Monday the most stressful day of the week. Knowing that after a whole day I have a session of art therapy to relax in helps"

"I never fully relax in lessons because a part of me worries that I will be put on the spot and won't know what to do. That hasn't happened here"

"I've had the chance to meet people in my year I didn't necessarily know very well"



The way your child has shown resilience and adaptability has really impressed their tutors and me. They will certainly need more of that as we move into the September of year 11, and beyond.


Please can I encourage you to think carefully about creating a balance over the summer. What I mean by this is to ask yourself these questions –

Year 9 - Miss Alcock



"Archer has been so kind to me, I've always felt included."


"I'm learning so much and the teachers make it so fun."
