sending them into the semi-finals to play Hurlingham (Chelsea) Academy School. Our girls fought hard and stayed level until the very last few minutes. A deflection from our player had awarded Hurlingham the goal they needed to secure a place in the finals.


### Areas that may need some attention:

Overall, it has been a largely positive picture, please do encourage your child to be prepared, ensuring they have everything they need to maximise this opportunity!






#### Year 9 - Mr Constantinou


### Year 8 – Mr Wick


