

ARCHER ADVENTURES IN NUMBERLAND - Mrs Williams

It's all about maths at school next week as we prepare to be immersed in Archer's Adventures In Numberland. All year groups will tasked with memorising the Fibonacci sequence amongst many other mathematical tasks.



Monday 7th February

We will be joined by Rob Eastaway who will be leading years 7 & 8 in the Curious Maths Quiz. This talk takes the form of a quiz, with audience members pairing up to answer the questions. What's curious about it is that there are only seven questions, and the answers are full of mathematical surprises. It's fun and interactive, and without even realising it, the audience are introduced to important ideas in algebra, trigonometry, fractal geometry and more. Year 9 will be hearing more about the maths of money games. If you think games are just for fun, then think again. Games contain some of the most important maths you'll ever need in daily life, from managing money to out-thinking competitors. In this highly

interactive talk in which the stakes get ever higher, your students will be on the edge of their seats as they discover the unlikely usefulness of probability, permutations and percentages. And they may even win something.

Alex is a best selling Maths author (Alex's Adventures in Numberland, our flagship book for the week, was a top ten bestseller in the UK), writes columns for the Guardian, has presented on Maths for the BBC, and frequently speaks at conferences and festivals. He recently won the prize for best science writer 2016 awarded by the Association of British Science Writers.



We will also be building the biggest, the best, the most fractally triangle – aka the Sierpinski Triangle.






Book Events:


